
*PRAYER OF CONFESSION

*ASSURANCE OF PARDON

Good Morning! After a vision, Jacob declared, "How awesome is this place! This is none other than the house of God" (Genesis 28:17). This worship space, too, is the house of God, and so is your heart. Welcome.

Thanks to everyone who helped make today's virtual worship on YouTube possible, and thanks to everyone who watches and encourages others to watch! Your words of encouragement and appreciation, and especially when you tell us others have started joining us through word-of-mouth invitation, mean very much!

Today after the service, the Church Council meets for July. We will, among other items of business, revisit our current plan for using our building for members and friends for worship and meetings. The bottom line so far is, if our area does not go backwards in the metrics of the growth of COVID-19, our tentative, cautious plan is to gather as a congregation for a prayer service on our front lawn Sunday, August 9th (probably after the Farmers Market and New Life Church are gone) with no definite time set yet. Then we hope to return to the very sanitized sanctuary and building for 10 AM worship on August 16th. This decision will be revisited at the Council meeting today, as will our decision about whether, when, and how much to open the offices with exposure to the public.

Pastor and Beth Lanford are leaving on vacation this coming Thursday. He will be on vacation through Monday, August 3rd, and will still have Tuesday off as part of his ³/₄ time situation. He will have lined up pastors who are willing to be contacted in case of pastoral emergency during his absence. Check with either Laura Olson, Jen Schneider or V.P. Judy Paige if you need to contact one of them!

According to the schedule, next Sunday's lector and lay liturgist will be Mandy Steegmueller. The guest preacher for that service will be the Rev. Catherine Watkins, a member of the Congregational Church of Evanston (U.C.C.) whose ministry experience and calling has primarily been in the realm of mental health. This will be her first time preaching here. Then for August 2nd, the Lector / lay liturgist is

scheduled to be Annie Noorts, working in tandem with our guest preacher and Communion celebrant for August 2nd, the Rev. Brittany Caine-Conley of the Night Ministry! She preached here last fall.

We are always grateful for any and all offerings to the church. No amount is too small! Wheat and Weeds Together

Jesus taught an agricultural and fishing people who were close to the source of the food they shared and consumed. Most people are many steps separated from the production of the food we eat each day. But, even if we have less understanding of agriculture than our ancestors did, we still understand that Jesus' command to feed one another refers to physical as well as spiritual feeding.

Whether or not they know where or how their food is grown, many United Church of Christ congregations affirm that food once produced is meant to be shared. Food pantries and meals offered by UCC congregations live out the most basic form of care for one another - giving of food.

Windsor Severance Food Pantry at Faith UCC in Colorado gives away the canned goods familiar to many food pantries. But they also offer an evening of fellowship and eating together each Wednesday evening. The pantry truly offers "a place at the table" for anyone in the neighborhood looking for a hot meal. The food pantry in Kirtland, Ohio's Old South United Church of Christ has seen so much need in recent years that they have expanded into three times their former space. SCRIPTURES FOR THE CONGREGATION

July 19th, 2020

ROMANS 8:12-25

"12So then, brothers and sisters, □ we are debtors, not to the flesh, to live according to the flesh—13 for if you live according to the flesh, you will die; but if by the Spirit you put to death the deeds of the body, you will live. 14For all who are led by the Spirit of God are children of God. 15For you did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you have received a spirit of adoption. When we cry, "Abba! □ Father!" 16 it is that very Spirit bearing witness □ with our spirit that we are children of God, 17 and if children, then heirs, heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ—if, in fact, we suffer with him so that we may also be glorified with him.

¹⁸I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory about to be revealed to us. ¹⁹For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the children of God; ²⁰for the creation was subjected to futility, not of its own will but by the will of the one who subjected it, in hope ²¹that the creation itself will be set free from its bondage to decay and will obtain the freedom of the glory of the children of God. ²²We know that the whole creation has been groaning in labor pains until now; ²³and not only the creation, but we ourselves, who have the first fruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly while we wait for adoption, the

redemption of our bodies. ²⁴For in hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what is seen? ²⁵But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience."

MATTHEW 13:24-30, 36-43

may be compared to someone who sowed good seed in his field; ²⁵but while everybody was asleep, an enemy came and sowed weeds among the wheat, and then went away. ²⁶So when the plants came up and bore grain, then the weeds appeared as well. ²⁷And the slaves of the householder came and said to him, 'Master, did you not sow good seed in your field? Where, then, did these weeds come from?' ²⁸He answered, 'An enemy has done this.' The slaves said to him, 'Then do you want us to go and gather them?' ²⁹But he replied, 'No; for in gathering the weeds you would uproot the wheat along with them. ³⁰Let both of them grow together until the harvest; and at harvest time I will tell the reapers, Collect the weeds first and bind them in bundles to be burned, but gather the wheat into my barn.'"

³⁶Then he left the crowds and went into the house. And his disciples approached him, saying, "Explain to us the parable of the weeds of the field." ³⁷He answered, "The one who sows the good seed is the Son of Man; ³⁸the field is the world, and the good seed are the

children of the kingdom; the weeds are the children of the evil one, ³⁹and the enemy who sowed them is the devil; the harvest is the end of the age, and the reapers are angels. ⁴⁰Just as the weeds are collected and burned up with fire, so will it be at the end of the age. ⁴¹The Son of Man will send his angels, and they will collect out of his kingdom all causes of sin and all evildoers, ⁴²and they will throw them into the furnace of fire, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth. ⁴³Then the righteous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. Let anyone with ears listen!
