
### **CALL TO OFFERING**



# Courage for Community (9/29/2024) GREEN 19th Sunday after Pentecost Esther 7:1-6, 9-10; 9:20-22

An ad sponsored by the Foundation to Combat Antisemitism, which ran during last winter's Super Bowl, reminded viewers that silence isn't golden when others are being persecuted. It featured Clarence B. Jones, a civil rights activist and draft speechwriter for Martin Luther King Jr., who, as images of hate flashed on the screen, spoke these words, "All hate thrives on one thing: silence."

A Jewish woman named Esther, who would become Queen of Persia, knew all about speaking up for the good of a community. Her story, recorded in the Book of Esther, tells of the Jewish people living in exile in Persia after the destruction of the First Temple. Under the reign of King Achashverosh, a royal advisor named Haman concocted a plot to wipe out the Persian Jewish community. Esther, along with her guardian, Mordechai, were able to foil Haman's plot and save the Jewish community.

At the climax of this story, when the Jewish community of Persia is facing imminent destruction, Mordechai calls on Esther to speak up on behalf of the Jewish people. Esther hesitates at first for she fears her own safety, being a Jew herself in the inner court. Mordechai reminds her that she is forever tied to the Jewish people and that her voice needs to be heard. In the end, Esther speaks up and her people are saved. To this day, Esther is remembered and celebrated as a hero and an advocate on the Jewish celebration known as Purim.

The need to speak is great, yet still so very scary for many of us as we fear our own safety and security. Throughout history, though, God calls for voices like Esther's, like Clarence B. Jones' — like yours —to speak for those whose voices are not being heard.

Ask God for the courage to do so and trust the words to come.

Loving God, give us the courage of Esther to speak up when we see communities hurting. May our words not be confrontational or hateful. Rather, may they be filled with love and point to your glory. Amen.

### Scriptures for Sunday, September 29, 2024

"Almighty God, by your Holy Spirit, illumine the sacred page, we pray, that our minds may be open to receive your Word, our hearts taught to love it, and our wills strengthened to obey it; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen"

### This morning's Psalter reading is Psalm 124.

If it had not been the LORD who was on our side

—let Israel now say—

<sup>2</sup> if it had not been the LORD who was on our side, when our enemies attacked us,

<sup>3</sup> then they would have swallowed us up alive, when their anger was kindled against us;

<sup>4</sup> then the flood would have swept us away;

the torrent would have gone over us;

<sup>5</sup> then over us would have gone the raging waters.

<sup>6</sup> Blessed be the LORD,

who has not given us

as prey to their teeth.

<sup>7</sup>We have escaped like a bird

from the snare of the hunters;

the snare is broken,

and we have escaped.

<sup>8</sup> Our help is in the name of the LORD,

who made heaven and earth.

### This ends the reading from the Psalms. Our epistle reading is James 5:13-20.

<sup>13</sup> Are any among you suffering? They should pray. Are any cheerful? They should sing songs of praise. <sup>14</sup> Are any among you sick? They should call for the elders of the church and have them pray over them, anointing them with oil in the name of the Lord. <sup>15</sup> The prayer of faith will save the sick, and the Lord will raise them up, and anyone who has committed sins will be forgiven. <sup>16</sup> Therefore confess your sins to one another and pray for one another, so that you may be healed. The prayer of the righteous is powerful and effective. <sup>17</sup> Elijah was a human like us, and he prayed

fervently that it might not rain, and for three years and six months it did not rain on the earth. <sup>18</sup> Then he prayed again, and the heaven gave rain, and the earth yielded its harvest.

<sup>19</sup> My brothers and sisters, if anyone among you wanders from the truth<sup>[a]</sup> and is brought back by another, <sup>20</sup> you should know that whoever brings back a sinner from wandering will save the sinner's<sup>[b]</sup> soul from death and will cover a multitude of sins.

This ends the reading of our epistle lesson. Our worship continues with a musical meditation.

Thank you, Ben. For those who are able, please stand for the reading of the Gospel. This morning's Gospel lesson is Mark 9:38-50.

<sup>38</sup> John said to him, "Teacher, we saw someone casting out demons in your name,<sup>[a]</sup> and we tried to stop him because he was not following us." <sup>39</sup> But Jesus said, "Do not stop him, for no one who does a deed of power in my name will be able soon afterward to speak evil of me. <sup>40</sup> Whoever is not against us is for us. <sup>41</sup> For truly I tell you, whoever gives you a cup of water to drink because you bear the name of Christ will by no means lose the reward.

<sup>42</sup> "If any of you cause one of these little ones who believe in me<sup>[b]</sup> to sin,<sup>[c]</sup> it would be better for you if a great millstone were hung around your neck and you were thrown into the sea. <sup>43</sup> If your hand causes you to sin,<sup>[d]</sup> cut it off; it is better for you to enter life maimed than to have two hands and to go to hell,<sup>[e]</sup> to the unquenchable fire.<sup>[f]</sup> <sup>45</sup> And if your foot causes you to sin,<sup>[g]</sup> cut it off; it is better for you to enter life lame than to have two feet and to be thrown into hell.<sup>[h][i]</sup> <sup>47</sup> And if your eye causes you to sin,<sup>[i]</sup> tear it out; it is better for you to enter the kingdom of God with one eye than to have two eyes and to be thrown into hell,<sup>[k]</sup> <sup>48</sup> where their worm never dies and the fire is never quenched.

<sup>49</sup> "For everyone will be salted with fire. [1] <sup>50</sup> Salt is good, but if salt has lost its saltiness, how can you season it? [m] Have salt in yourselves, and be at peace with one another."

This concludes our gospel lesson for this morning's service. May God grant us a wise and generous understanding of this God's holy word.
