## CALL TO WORSHIP

- P: Like Israel in Isaiah 58, let us wonder if God hears and honors our worship.
- C: The people of God wondered in Micah 6 what the Lord wanted from them.
- P: God told us that Israel asked God, "Why do we fast, but You do not see? Why humble ourselves and You do not notice?"

- C: The Lord told them why, too, which is teaching for us: "Look, you serve your own interest on your fast day... only to quarrel and fight. Such fasting as you do today will not make your voice heard on high."
- P: The Lord then said to those wondering, "Is not this the fast that I choose: To loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the thongs of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free and to break every yoke?"
- C: We are reminded that as we gather in worship and praise, God looks for the integrity of a people who worship but also walk the talk by doing what is just, and seeking to end oppression of the vulnerable and weaker.
- P: May we always find the Lord pleased with our worship, never turning away.
- C: Yes, that is up to us! Being taught, let us praise the Triune God with our works and from the heart!

#### **CALL TO CONFESSION**

P: In Matthew 7, Jesus said "Not everyone who says to me, 'Lord, Lord,' will enter the kingdom of heaven, but only the one who does the will of my Father in heaven" (v. 21). Looking deeply within, or perhaps we're all too painfully aware of how we have left the Christ-path to forge our own self-oriented way, are we not grateful for warnings and moved to heartfelt confession? Let us take this opportunity to come clean with God and return to the will and love of God.

#### PRAYER OF CONFESSION

P: Great God, when we see people who are lonely and grieving, sometimes we walk by. When we see or know people who are out of work, suffering mental health challenges, mourning the loss of relationship, sometimes we walk by. We are more worried about getting our steps in than trying to be a channel of love or righteousness.

WOMEN: Because some people are only faces in the news, or statistics in a column, we do not pause. Other people are so close to us that we do not recognize how they have been hijacked on the road of their circumstances.

MEN:

When we have seen the voiceless, we figure someone else will advocate for what is right for them. When we have learned about the truly powerless in the face of established forces that want to keep all the power, not helping the oppressed or impoverished, usually we do not speak out on their behalf.

A:

We are motivated to act and pray in order to hold onto what we have, and hope to have, but not to expand freedoms, to dig into systemic roots of poverty and injustice, or to work for fairness for "the least of these," where Jesus is. Forgive us. Reorient us! Have mercy on us, hear our confession and renew our minds and hearts to return to God's will for those under a voke they did not fashion or earn. In Jesus' precious name we pray. Amen.

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
#### ASSURANCE OF PARDON

P: Paul wrote to the Church at Rome, "I appeal to you therefore, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship. Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God – what is good and acceptable and perfect" (12:1-2).

By the mercies of God, Paul said. We are forgiven by the grace of God that we know in Jesus Christ crucified and resurrected! By these same mercies, as a manifestation of the new life we're given, Paul urges us to forsake conformity to the selfish values of much of the world, and embrace those we find in Jesus, in compassion, honesty, service and hope. Thanks be to God, right, for God's inexpressible gift of forgiveness and change! Let the people say . . .

# MISSION MOMENTS

August 20, 2023 Twelfth Sunday after Pentecost Genesis 45:1-15 Bold Moves

In today's story, Joseph, having achieved success and power in Egypt, is reunited with his brothers who assumed that he was dead or enslaved in terrible conditions. Consider the words of this meditation as an invitation to reconcile a difficulty in your own life.

Imagine yourself standing, beginning to walk. You move with ease, each step making you stronger, never tiring...Imagine that you come to a hill and you begin to climb, noticing the terrain around you. It is the most beautiful kind of hill you can imagine. What does it look like? Is it dry desert and rock? Rain forest? Mountain meadow? Glaciers?

Now imagine that you get to the top of the hill, and the view of the valleys and plains around you opens up. You can see a long way. Imagine that the place spread before you is the country of your life...It is populated with all the people you have known and every place you have ever been and everything you have ever done. As you look over it, you can see it at a distance, yet you can

see it all clearly – the country of your life...Take a few moments to locate someone precious, or something that brings you joy, or someplace that brings you peace from sometime in your life. Enjoy your memories and feelings as you look upon that beloved person, object or place....

Now turn your gaze. Somewhere in the vast country of your life, there is something that still feels out of place. It is time to look at the thing that it is time to forgive. From your safe place, high on the hill, you can look at it with fresh eyes. You can see that thing for what it is — one thing in the country of your life, not the whole of it.

You know what it is – this thing that needs forgiving.... Is it something in yourself? Or done by another?... Look at it from this distance and with this clarity. See again how the thing that needs forgiving is only one place in the country of your life – one part (whether large or small) of all the vastness that you have seen and known....

Allow yourself to imagine how it would change the geography of the country of your life if you were to forgive the thing that needs forgiving...Would the thing change in shape or color? Would it reflect or absorb the light in a different way? ... Would it become smaller? Would it disappear altogether, leaving room for something new? ....

Allow yourself to imagine forgiving that thing. Allow yourself to imagine that it is already forgiven by a God whose love is more powerful than any human act. When you are ready, return to this place and this time.

## **Exodus 21:22-25**

"When people who are fighting injure a pregnant woman so that there is a miscarriage, and yet no further harm follows, the one responsible shall be fined what the woman's husband demands, paying as much as the judges determine. If any harm follows, then you shall give life for life, eye for eye, tooth for tooth, hand for hand, foot for foot, burn for burn, wound for wound, stripe for stripe."

## Psalm 82:1-4

God has taken his place in the divine council;

in the midst of the gods he holds judgment:

"How long will you judge unjustly and show partiality to the wicked? *Selah* Give justice to the weak and the orphan;

maintain the right of the lowly and the destitute.

Rescue the weak and the needy; deliver them from the hand of the wicked."

## **Proverbs 31:6-9**

Give strong drink to one who is perishing,

and wine to those in bitter distress;

let them drink and forget their poverty,

and remember their misery no more.

Speak out for those who cannot speak, for the rights of all the destitute.

Speak out, judge righteously, defend the rights of the poor and needy.

This morning the Gospel is Luke Chapter 4, verses 16 through 30. We find the already-traveling Jesus coming home and attending his hometown synagogue in Nazareth, where he as asked to read and teach. By the end of the passage, most will wish that they had not.

## **Luke 4:16-30**

When Jesus came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, he went to the synagogue on the sabbath day, as was his custom. He stood up to read, and the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was given to him. He unrolled the scroll and found the place where it was written:

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me,

because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor.

He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives

and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor."

And he rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the attendant, and sat down. The eyes of all in the synagogue were fixed on him.

Then he began to say to them, "Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing."

All spoke well of him and were amazed at the gracious words that came from his mouth. They said, "Is not this Joseph's son?" He said to them, "Doubtless you will quote to me this proverb, 'Doctor, cure yourself!' And you will say, 'Do here also in your hometown the things that we have heard you did at Capernaum."

And he said, "Truly I tell you, no prophet is accepted in the prophet's hometown. But the truth is, there were many widows in Israel in the time of Elijah, when the heaven was shut up three years and six months, and there was a severe famine over all the land; yet Elijah was sent to none of them except to a widow at Zarephath in Sidon. There were also many lepers in Israel in the time of the prophet Elisha, and none of them was cleansed except Naaman the Syrian."

When they heard this, all in the synagogue were filled with rage. They got up, drove him out of the town, and led him to the brow of the hill on which their town was built, so that they might hurl him off the cliff. But he passed through the midst of them and went on his way.
