



ANNOUNCEMENTS

Thanks to everyone who helped make today's virtual worship on YouTube possible, and thanks to everyone who watches and encourages others to watch! Your words of encouragement and appreciation, and especially when you tell us others have started joining us through word-of-mouth invitation, mean very much!

June is now known around the country (if not the world) as Pride Month, honoring the achievements, gifts and sacrifices made by those in the LGBTQ+communities. When St. Peter's U.C.C. became an Open and Affirming Congregation almost two years ago, shortly afterward the Church Council voted to join the Chicago Coalition of Welcoming Churches (CCWC). The Coalition is creating a video montage (or "Tribute") for Pride 2020 and has invited member congregations, including St. Peter's, to participate. It will only take a minute (2 minutes max) for our church/community to record and submit a message. The Coalition, keeping social distancing in mind, encourages us to be unique and reflect our community. So Pastor Lanford and perhaps a band of merry others of St. Peter's U.C.C. will

record and submit something before the June 22nd deadline. CCWC will then compile the submissions into a single video message which will be shared for our church to use, as well as placed on Facebook and the CCWC website.

In related Open and Affirming / CCWC news, with the Chicago Pride Parade cancelled due to COVID-19, CCWC plans this: "In lieu of our traditional Pride Brunch, CCWC will be hosting a celebration on Saturday June 27th at 10 AM. The event will be held on Zoom. We are busy working on the details, including an exciting, soul nourishing program. We will also debut the Pride video at the celebration."

UPDATES: Ginger's friend (and attendee at some St. Peter's functions) Marty has been discharged from the hospital. She has gone to a rehab place in Andersonville. Beth Lanford's brother Dan's partner Eric was hospitalized over BP / kidney issues but has improved markedly. Tests continued last week. Please include them in prayers! Thanks. Tragically, Karen Christianson's sister Chris hit her head in a fall, creating a brain-bleed and becoming unconscious. She died Thursday. No further news is available at this writing.

We hope to keep our freshly-repainted entrance doors to the St. Peter's building clean looking as long as possible, and some new informational / directional signs for being by doors are coming, we ask: Please, don't anyone tape anything to the doors! Old tape was one of the biggest issues in painting our new doors. We are looking into mounting a "tape rail" – a thin piece of black plastic to

adhere signs etc. to when needed. But for now, PLEASE don't tape anything to the doors!

The Micah 6:8 Committee is organizing a study group based on "White Privilege: Let's Talk—A Resource for **Transformational Dialogue,"** a UCC curriculum for adults designed to invite church members to engage in safe, meaningful, substantive, and bold conversations on race. The group will meet via Zoom one evening a week over a sixweek period starting Wednesday, June 24. This study group involves a commitment to complete selected readings and short videos—all available online and distributed at the start of the course—before joining in reflective conversation based on the materials. The reading and videos, to be completed on one's own time, will require a weekly commitment of about an hour before each 60- to 90-minute Zoom discussion. The Rev. John C. Dorhauer, UCC General Minister and President and contributor to the curriculum, put it this way, "Jesus once said those who have eyes to see, see." Rev. Dorhauer continued by saying, the hope is for an ongoing conversation about race—one that enables White allies to better see and understand how privilege works, thereby equipping all for a sacred journey toward racial equity. To receive a study outline and consider joining the discussion, please express your interest in an email to Pastor Lanford or Micah 6:8 Committee member Peggy Reins (McCoy) as soon as possible and no later than June 22.

Sarah Laughed

Sarah laughed when she heard the news that, in her advanced age, she would bear a child. She did not expect that she had much life left to give. Too often, our culture reflects Sarah's belief that there is not much life left in our elders.

SCRIPTURES FOR THE CONGREGATION

June 14, 2020

Genesis 18:1-15; 21:1-7

The LORD appeared to Abraham by the oaks of Mamre, as he sat at the entrance of his tent in the heat of the day. He looked up and saw three men standing near him. When he saw them, he ran from the tent entrance to meet them, and bowed down to the ground. He said, "My lord, if I find favor with you, do not pass by your servant. Let a little water be brought, and wash your feet, and rest yourselves under the tree. Let me bring a little bread, that you may refresh yourselves, and after that you may pass on—since you have come to your servant." So they said, "Do as you have said."

And Abraham hastened into the tent to Sarah, and said, "Make ready quickly three measures of choice flour, knead it, and make cakes." Abraham ran to the herd, and took a calf, tender and good, and gave it to the servant, who hastened to prepare it. Then he took curds and milk and the calf that he had prepared, and set it before them; and he stood by them under the tree while they ate.

They said to him, "Where is your wife Sarah?" And he said, "There, in the tent." Then one said, "I will surely return to you in due season, and your wife Sarah shall have a son." And Sarah was listening at the tent entrance behind him.

Now Abraham and Sarah were old, advanced in age; it had ceased to be with Sarah after the manner of women. So Sarah laughed to herself, saying, "After I have grown old, and my husband is old, shall I have pleasure?" The LORD said to Abraham, "Why did Sarah laugh, and say, 'Shall I indeed bear a child, now that I am old?' Is anything too wonderful for the LORD? At the set time I will return to you, in due season, and Sarah shall have a son." But Sarah denied, saying, "I did not laugh"; for she was afraid. He said, "Oh yes, you did laugh."

21:1-7

The LORD dealt with Sarah as he had said, and the LORD did for Sarah as he had promised. Sarah conceived and bore Abraham a son in his old age, at the time of which God had spoken to him. Abraham gave the name Isaac to his son whom Sarah bore him. And Abraham circumcised his son Isaac when he was eight days old, as God had commanded him. Abraham was a hundred years old when his son Isaac was born to him. Now Sarah said, "God has brought laughter for me; everyone who hears will laugh with me." And she said, "Who would ever have said to Abraham that Sarah would nurse children? Yet I have borne him a son in his old age."

Matthew 9:35-38, 10:1-8

Then Jesus went about all the cities and villages, teaching in their synagogues, and proclaiming the good news of the kingdom, and

curing every disease and every sickness. When he saw the crowds, he had compassion for them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest."

Then Jesus summoned his twelve disciples and gave them authority over unclean spirits, to cast them out, and to cure every disease and every sickness. These are the names of the twelve apostles: first, Simon, also known as Peter, and his brother Andrew; James son of Zebedee, and his brother John; Philip and Bartholomew; Thomas and Matthew the tax collector; James son of Alphaeus, and Thaddaeus; Simon the Cananaean, and Judas Iscariot, the one who betrayed him.

These twelve Jesus sent out with the following instructions: "Go nowhere among the Gentiles, and enter no town of the Samaritans, but go rather to the lost sheep of the house of Israel. As you go, proclaim the good news, 'The kingdom of heaven has come near.' Cure the sick, raise the dead, cleanse the lepers, cast out demons. You received without payment; give without payment."
